ROMEO AND MATILDA ADJUSTING THEIR COURSE





No one could have predicted what happened in 2009. The husband lost his job and for more than a year was unable to find employment here in the Pacific Northwest. She howled and growled. Within a couple of days, however, she had settled in and allowed us to see the sweetness of her real personality. Romeo, a handsome black and white tuxedo, is a shy boy. His response to new situations is to hide. For several days after arrival, he covered himself completely with his blankets, but when we touched him his body responded by relaxing.

Young sisters Venus and Vizzy both gave birth within days of one another in a big old dog crate inside a junk filled broken down shed. They shared mothering duties and comforted each other. When MEOW was asked to take several cats and kittens from this home, it was evident from the start that these two should remain together always. While in foster care together, they continued to nurture each other and to alternate feeding all eight of the kittens they were raising.



Now that they are at the shelter, Venus is the ring leader and tends to do the exploring first. Venus scored as a Personal Assistant on her Meet Your Match Evaluation. This means that she adjusts to new situations

fairly quickly and is a gregarious cat. Sweet Vizzy scored as a Sidekick on her MYM Evaluation. This means that she adjusts to new situations fairly quickly and is a social girl but also likes her alone time. Once adopted, Venus and Vizzy will start to explore their new space fairly quickly. You'll win their affection by bringing them toys and treats. Once they are coming to greet you when you enter their room, it will be time to start introducing them to the rest of the house. One of their favorite sports is window-gazing, so they'd love a comfy sleeping spot with a window view. They will be good hostesses, happy to meet your guests if approached or called. They both love toys and will show off the back flips they have learned trying to catch one of their wand toys. One of their other very favorite pastimes is to be petted and they will thank you with loud purring. They are both quite comfortable being held and would

do well in a home with children. Venus and Vizzy would love a home where they can enjoy the company of a kind human companion. They'll quietly entertain themselves and each other while you're away at work. They're very grateful for the new life

This year's event hosted over 250 attendees and was supported by ten local business sponsors, more than 50 event volunteers including shelter staff, volunteers and their friends and family members from our feline and canine divisions, National Charity League moms and daughters and Jet City Roller Girls.

New this year, our attendees were thoroughly entertained by local celebrity emcee and auctioneer, John Curley. Also new this year was a dessert dash with scrumptious desserts donated by local businesses and individuals. Especially exciting were the funds raised: over \$55,000 (including \$11,000 raised for the Mercy Fund), exceeding last year's total by over 25%! Fabulous news for the animals of MEOW!

This year's silent auction featured over 250 unique items, donated by generous individuals, artists, restaurants, hotels, retailers, pet stores, and service providers.

During the live auction, attendees were touched by a video highlighting a few of the special needs animals that have been helped by our Mercy Fund, filmed and produced by volunteer Marc Castillo. John Curley started the live auction with a fun filled "Heads or Tails" game which got bidders on their feet, and kept the competitive excitement flowing throughout the live auction. Popular items included a week stay in Hawaii, sponsorship of the free roaming rooms at MEOW, custom labeled case of wine with the high bidder's pet's picture, a stained glass shar pei, a Mutts comic strip print autographed by the artist, private wine tastings, paragliding and more!

Navin's striking good looks could be considered both a blessing and a curse. His long white coat and pale blue eyes make him a handsome example of his Turkish Angora roots. Unfortunately, up to 85 percent of cats of this description are carriers of the gene for congenital deafness. We're quite certain that Navin is completely deaf. He does not respond to the sound of his name or to other noises in his environment. He sleeps very soundly and startles easily. But Navin's silent world is still filled with joy.




In his Meet Your Match evaluation, 4-year old Navin scores as a Sidekick, showing the ability to adapt fairly quickly to new situations. He is a social bov but he can also amuse himself when alone. Once settled into a home of his own, Navin will likely greet family and guests with enthusiasm. He'll enjoy interactive toys and games with his human friends. Navin would do best in a home without other pets or small children, who might move quickly or unpredictably.

Although deaf cats like Navin are considered to be "special needs", there is no special care required, just some common sense suggestions to keep them safe and happy.

- Never let a hearing-impaired cat outside. He lacks the ability to hear traffic or other outdoor perils.
- Attach a bell to your deaf cat's collar so you can locate him anywhere in the house. He can't hear you calling his name.
- Alert your deaf cat to your comings and goings by touching him gently when you enter or leave a room.
- Avoid sudden movements and activities which might startle or frighten a deaf cat.
- If you need to wake him, softly shake the bed or chair on which he is lying or turn the lights on and off.
- To get his attention, throw a small ball or toy into his line of sight but not at him, or gently stomp on the floor nearby.

Navin is open to all of these ideas, and he's ready to try them out in a brand new home. Permanent hearing loss cannot be reversed, but cats are extremely adaptable and will use their other senses to compensate and continue to enjoy a good quality of life. Some people have reported teaching their deaf cat sign language. we think Navin might already be reading lips. He seems to understand perfectly when we say to him, "Navin, you hand-some boy, we love you."



At the end of June we had to bid a very fond farewell to Assistant Shelter Manager Tiffany Lutnick. On July 11th, she and husband Anthony welcomed a beautiful baby boy, Sebastian, into their family. Their four cats are adjusting well to sharing their home. Tiffany promises to come back to MEOW once Sebastian's ready for some time away from Mom.



WHERE'S WINTER?

SEYMOUR FROM FERAL TO FAMILY

On a damp and windy evening in spring 2009, we caught a glimpse of a big brown tabby with huge and terrified eyes as he darted into the bushes in our yard and then ran away. We called to him, but he only ran faster. We began putting food out each day and he nervously gobbled it up and left quickly. He was very frightened, jumpy and cautious. The sound of the door opening or voices would send him running. After a few weeks of this, we were able to trap him and have him neutered and ear-tipped, the procedure to indicate that a feral cat has been altered.

We continued to feed this handsome boy. In fall the weather turned cold, wet and windy. A glimpse of us through the window caused him to disappear for days. He refused to go near the shelters, fleece, and blankets we provided. Watching him struggle in the bitter winter air was heartbreaking. Still, we tried to gain his trust. Near the end of winter, he began to linger just a bit, taking the time to groom himself after feeding. He still ran, but only a few feet away. When he heard our voices, the look in his eyes softened.



Then early this spring, we heard a meowing sound at dinner time. Could it be? It was! He was sitting nearby waiting for us! We spent hours outside talking to him and he sat quietly, listening intently. Our big day came in May when we were able to touch

him for the first time. It was brief, but oh so satisfying. In time, light touches became petting and rubbing and at last he rolled over and offered his belly to us.

Today, Seymour lives with us – inside the house! He lounges on the furniture, winds all around our legs asking for pets, plays with and grooms our other cats, sleeps in sunbeams on his back (and only snores a little) and is in charge of backyard surveillance through the window.

It took more than a year, but given time and patience, this sweet boy decided that humans are okay after all. Seymour is like so many of the free-roaming cats in our communities who, given half a chance, could be happily and successfully integrated into a home. Could there be a Seymour in your neighborhood?



You may remember reading about Winter, a young cat who's suffered a lifechanging spinal injury, rendering her incontinent but still able to walk and jump, like any other cat. She also tests positive for Feline Immunodeficiency Virus. Because MEOW does not have the

type of facility which could offer Winter a comfortable and spacious place to live out her life, we were very fortunate to secure a place for her at Best Friends Animal Sanctuary in Kanab, Utah.

In May, two MEOW volunteers accompanied her on the flight to Salt Lake City and the six hour drive to the sanctuary. Winter was the perfect passenger, relaxed, patient and quiet. At SeaTac Airport, she enchanted other travelers as she sat contentedly on a chair or stretched her legs on the carpet. She wore a bright red walking jacket harness with matching leash. Throughout the trip, she was cheerful and calm. After more than 14 hours spent mostly in her carrier, she was so happy to be allowed to sleep on the bed the hotel room. Now she lives in Kitty Motel, where there are other FIV+ cats, most of them males. We're told that Winter is very happy there, and that the boys like having a feminine touch around the place.

To repay the kindness extended to Winter, MEOW is assisting in the placement of a group of cats lovingly called The Outlaws. These are big guys who do not take kindly to any other cats, but love people, so they will be adopted as "only" pets. To learn

Meanwhile, back at the ranch, 'Winter Meow' still posts occasional entries on Facebook to her nearly 5,000 friends. She continues to enchant staff and visitors at Best Friends. It's our hope that one day she may be adopted, but even if not, she certainly is living her very best life. We could not be happier for her. We miss you, Miss Winter!
