#### TREY ~ THREE STRIKES AND YOU'RE SAFEL

This friendly little black and white cat had become accustomed to greeting a woman when she arrived home from work. Unable to make him her own, she determined that the best she could do for him was have him neutered and put him back out, hoping he'd find a home elsewhere.

On the day of his neuter, the vet discovered that this young cat had a severe

case of feline stomatitis, an extremely painful inflammation of his mouth and gums; generally very difficult to treat. Unless this homeless cat could receive treatment, euthanasia would be the kindest option. It would be irresponsible to turn him loose and allow him to suffer. This message did not reach his caregiver. Had she answered her phone, euthanasia would have been authorized during his surgery.

On receiving the bad news, the woman was heartsick but did what she thought was right – she took him to an emergency vet for euthanasia. In the meantime, a MEOW rescuer, aware of this cat, called the shelter to ask about the likelihood of a young cat with severe stomatitis making a good recovery. Should we intervene? The caregiver was at that moment leaving a voicemail to let the rescuer know of her decision.

The clock was ticking. Surely it must be too late this time. Having been told that MEOW would accept the cat, the rescuer suffered several minutes of frantic phone calls which finally led to the emergency clinic, to the back room, and to the vet. Yes! The cat was still alive!

Safe! Following antibiotic treatment for infection and then full mouth extractions, Trey has become healthy and pain free. We're amazed and grateful for the miracles that occurred on that fateful day. After undergoing neuter surgery, the life of this homeless cat literally hung in the balance while he was handled, transferred, sentenced to an untimely death, and then saved at the 11th hour. It was a day of distress and a day of blessings. A precious life was saved because of missed calls and last minute connections. A precious life was saved because someone worked feverishly to offer this cat the opportunity to overcome the medical hand he had been dealt. A precious life was saved because that's what we do.

#### TAKING CHANCES AND MAKING CHANGES

Independent cat rescuers are faced with hard choices nearly every day. They each do what they are capable of doing financially, physically and emotionally. Many max out their credit cards and sacrifice their own health to save the animals. Help may come from shelters, who can place their rescued cats, as well as from their fellow rescuers, who can offer moral support when the choices they have to make are painful.

Recently, one such rescuer was faced with some difficult decisions after trapping an apparently feral cat with a broken back leg. Releasing him to an emergency hospital would cost nothing but would probably result in euthanasia. Bringing him to her veterinarian for evaluation and treatment would mean another expensive bill. She decided she had to give him a chance. The radiographs revealed a badly broken pelvis and her vet reported that he was "an aggressive feral".

At first, Marco didn't want anything to do with this strange woman who had made him her prisoner. However, she had offered him delicious food, and plenty of it, and the bed was soft and warm. Within a couple of weeks, Marco was beginning to feel much better. He was getting accustomed to his captor's voice. Now it was his turn to make

some decisions. He could continue to put up his feral front, or he could let down his guard. He decided he had to give her a chance.

Time heals most everything. By the time his shattered pelvis had healed, so had the heart of this warrior cat. He no longer felt the need to protect himself from the woman who had taken him in, restored his health, and lovingly offered him a chance to reinvent himself. Marco might be one of the luckiest cats ever, to have landed in that trap, on that night, to come into the care of that rescuer. Today Marco loves human attention, happily purring and kneading the air. He even comes when called. Marco has a future because he and this selfless and generous independent rescuer both made life-changing decisions to take a chance.

#### TERRENCE THE LIBRARIAN

Terrence is one of those cats. His big, cheeky face, his

muscular body, his kind, soulful, magnetic eyes – you have to stop and say hello.

Spotted at a feral feeding station, he looked a little rough around the edges, but he clearly was not feral. If only he could tell us his story. Now completely vetted, he's looking for a real home.

Residing in "The Library" at MEOW, Terrence is the self-appointed greeter and snuggler extraordinaire. He'll make sure that, when it comes to attention, you have what you need. He'll be all over you and even then that won't be close enough for him. He's very interactive in other ways too: he meows, rubs against your legs and puts his paws on your lap. Still kind of kittenish at five years old, he enjoys batting around toy balls; no bells though, it is a library after all.

Terrence is one of two FIV+ cats currently in The Library. He gets along very well with other cats. It was no surprise that his Meet Your Match Feline-ality is that of a Leader of the Band. "I'm the cat who does everything in a big way. I not only like to be in the middle of things – I like to lead the parade. I'm an adventurous cat, but I'll still make plenty of time to show you my affectionate side. I'm the demonstrative type, you might say. Want a cat who's brimming with confidence? That's me!"

Per Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine, FIV is not easily spread among cats who do not fight. "The primary mode of transmission is through bite wounds. Casual, non-aggressive contact does not appear to be an efficient route of spreading FIV; as a result, cats in households with stable social structures where housemates do not fight are at little risk for acquiring FIV infections." Terrence may have had to defend his honor in his early life on the road, but these days he's a lover, not a fighter. He's looking for a family to love and to start a new chapter in his surely storied life. Go ahead. Look into those eyes and check him out. We double dog dare you.

#### SMOKEY JOE

Smokey Joe is a happy, handsome blue-grey guy who enjoys the company of other cats and enthusiastically greets human visitors to his suite at MEOW. He came to us recently due to what we politely refer to as "a history of dietary indiscretions." Fabric, plastic, hair bands, even electrical cords can have a certain attraction for cats like Smokey Joe, with a syn-

drome called Feline Pica. While chewing and sucking on fabric, or your earlobe, might be relatively common in cats, compulsively eating inedible things is not. In addition to being annoying to humans, this behavior is extremely dangerous for cats. Intestinal obstructions, which can be fatal if not caught immediately and remedied with surgery, is not uncommon in cats with Pica. We are working with Smokey Joe to conquer his compulsion. He's happy to provide a few tips for keeping cats like him with Pica tendencies safe.

"Make sure I'm not sick or nutrient deficient". Changes in behavior can indicate a health issue.

"Have we undergone life changes that might be stressing me?" Make sure I have a safe, quiet place to call my own and lots of love.

"Am I bored?" Puzzle toys with treats keep me exercised and mentally stimulated.

"Prozac®?" Studies have shown that multi-pronged treatment plans with interactive toys, high fiber diet and therapeutic drugs, have sometimes been successful in minimizing Pica behaviors.

"No matter what, keep things out of my reach!" A regular routine of checking that ingestible items are safely stored will help limit access and keeps the house tidy as well,

Back at the shelter, Smokey Joe loves the company of others, bird watching, chasing safe toys, and playing 'find every food dish'. He is seeking a home with companion cats, or dogs, or humans who might like to play fetch (to keep him entertained and active) and a family that will be aware of his tendencies, work with him to curb those tendencies and keep him safe.

### PUSSYCAT PANTRY HELP STOCK THE SHELTER SHELVES

Today the cats' fondest wish is for canned food, a staple at MEOW. Every day we open dozens of cans. Some of our cats are fed canned food exclusively.
